NEW Thinking About Sterilization Timing

Researchers at the University of California, Davis, recently completed a 10-year study that evaluated when best to sterilize (spay/neuter) dogs to best avoid incidences of joint disease and certain types of cancers across 35 different breeds. (See the study **here**.)

The joint disorders examined include hip dysplasia, cranial cruciate ligament tears, and elbow dysplasia. Cancers examined include lymphoma, hemangiosarcoma or cancer of the blood vessel walls, mast cell tumors, and osteosarcoma or bone cancer.

The results of the study were quite interesting and the overall finding was that in the case of most breeds, the age of sterilization has no effect on the risk of developing joint disease or cancer.


Researchers did see that the risk of developing joint disease was related to size, with smaller dogs seeing fewer issues and larger dogs being more affected. The interesting exceptions to this were two giant breeds (Great Danes and Irish Wolfhounds) that showed no increase in joint disease regardless of when they were sterilized.

It was also noted that the occurrence of cancer in small breed dogs was quite low regardless of when or if they were sterilized. Again, there were two exceptions as both the Shih Tzu and Boston Terrier showed a significant increase in cancer occurrence after sterilization.

The long and the short of it is, there is no one perfect age to recommend when a dog should be sterilized. I would highly suggest you have this discussion with your veterinarian and consider your decision based on the dog's breed, size, gender, and other risk factors.

Hopefully, studies like this will open the door to more research in this field.

Turning That 'No' into a 'Yes'

Golden Retrievers are beautiful, loyal, and loving animals and also masters at manipulating their humans for love, attention, and food. One look from those adoring eyes is usually enough to fold even the strongest of dispositions. In their mind, if the adoring look doesn't work then maybe if I put my head in your lap, lean into you or put my paw on you until you notice, then you'll give me what I want. When our dogs invade our space, our first reaction is often to reach out and touch. pet or cuddle them not realizing how theirs is actually guite demanding behaviour that can lead to dominance issues down the road. As the saying goes, you teach people how to treat you and when you allow your dog to constantly invade your space and demand attention, then you teach them that they can do this whenever they want without being invited and that your space is not respected. Instead, when this happens, and you want to give your dog some love, the easiest thing to do is to take a step away from your dog crouching down and calling them to you. Make the dog come to you and when they do, reward them generously. If you are always the one approaching the dog, swarming them with love, then the dog might totally snub you when you're trying to get them to come to you. You want your dog to be eager to come to you for love but if they get too much they won't. This will also make using the 'come' command a lot easier. Remember that even for dogs, too much can be annoving. Whether saying no to your cute cuddle bug or to your own impulses, this is one of the hardest things you'll ever have to do but is essential to your relationship long-term. Like children, indulging them all the time does not make them well behaved and will instead lead to

them becoming spoiled, demanding, and selfish. This is why it's important to be able to say 'no' to your dog and here are some tips you can use to turn that 'no' into a 'yes'.

It's totally acceptable to say 'no' to your dog but it's important that you don't leave it at that. You're not truly finished until you've hit the 'yes' and shown your dog what they can do. The first thing you should do when you want your dog to know that you mean business is to stand up. You cannot properly train your dog from a seated position. And yelling across the room will only teach your dog that you're not serious about what you are saying. Your body language is so important when working with your dog and is crucial to the way our dogs understand us. For best results, try and replicate, with your own behaviour, how a dog shows another dog when they mean business. If you stand up straight and tall holding your whole body stiff while looking down at the dog through the corner of your eye, then they will know you are serious and not fooling around and they must respect your space. It's important that you do NOT loom over the dog staring them directly in the eyes because then the dog may perceive this as a challenge and react negatively.

Now that you have shown the dog what they can't do, it's time to show them what they can. To get to the 'yes' first, we must know the dog's currency. Do they prefer to have something in their mouth like a cherished toy (this is often a favourite for Goldens)? Or is it a chest pat, ear scratch or bum rub they prefer? Each dog has different rewards that they like more than others and you want to use the one your dog loves the most.



Once you determine what your dog really likes, it's now time to use it; however, the timing is crucial. Most people say 'no' to their dog for a quick second and if they don't get a good response, then move on and try something else or worse, give up. When you're holding the no stance (standing tall with head turned away looking at the dog through the corner of your eye) you need to hold it for a little longer. It's like playing a game of chicken with your dog and whoever is the last to give up is the winner. You need to hold that stance until your dog shows you a submissive sign by either sitting and/or laying



down or you see their ears turning down and falling back or a combination of these.

While you're holding your stance and as soon as the dog shows you those submissive signals, crouch down and praise them. Now is your chance to give the dog a toy or the best belly rubs they've ever had. Even when praising your dog though, it is recommended that you don't pet them too rough. Rough, fast contact and scrunching the fingers in their coat can replicate biting and you don't want your dog to think you're biting them. This will only encourage rough play and dominant behaviour.

One of the things I always say is that dogs love to have a job to do and they really love to please us, so rewarding for good behaviour (the 'yes') is very important. This is especially true when it immediately follows you telling them 'no' for their undesirable behaviour. It will teach your dog to be mannerly and listen and to do what they're told and that when they do, they will be rewarded handsomely.

As dog owners, we are all human and loving our dogs and wanting to fulfill all of their needs is normal and understandable. Knowing how cute and cuddly your dog is makes it very difficult to say 'no' but ultimately having a strong 'no' allows you to get to the 'yes' faster and establishes boundaries for you and your dog to thrive and helps ensure a long healthy relationship between you and your pup.

THE TRAINING CORNER

EVERY DOG HAS A BUCKET

And we have one too! No, it's not a bucket full of toys. It's a STRESS bucket. Now you may think, why on earth would my dog be stressed? They have a nice comfy place to sleep, two square meals a day, not to mention cookies, treats, yummy things to eat, toys, and walks.

Well, it might surprise you to learn what things can, in fact, stress them out.

Let's talk about the bucket first. The bucket may be very large or it may be very small and it has nothing to do with the size of your dog. Every bucket has a hole in the bottom of it. This is where stress empties out. Once again, the hole may be very large or it may be very small and it has no relation to the size of the bucket. A very large dog might have a very small bucket with either a very small hole or a large hole. A very small dog could have a very large bucket which has a large or small hole. The size of the bucket depends on how much your dog can handle ~ in other words, how much stress are they able to cope with. The size of the hole depends on how quickly they can decompress. If they are able to bring their arousal level down quickly, then they probably have a large hole in the bottom of their bucket. On the other hand, if they remain on high alert or their arousal level quickly increases, they most likely have a small hole in the bottom of their bucket.

Let me explain what I mean by arousal level in our dogs. Arousal refers to when a dog is scared, excited or frustrated. Anything that causes your dog to become scared, excited or frustrated can pay into the bucket. Also, every negative and positive experience can pay into the bucket. Unfortunately, when the bucket is full, anything else that pays into the bucket causes it to overflow, which results in reactivity. Another thing that pays into the bucket is if your dog has health issues. Things like pain, itchiness or stomach issues contribute to filling the bucket. Think about when you're not feeling well. My husband knows to stay away from me when I'm not feeling well because I get really grumpy as I don't have time to be sick. How about when you have an upset stomach or suffer from allergies. What's your mood like then? It's no different for your dog. When your dog is over aroused or stressed, it may manifest as lunging, barking, biting, mouthing, destruction, pacing, whining, nagging, humping, zoomies, not listening, and more.

Now it may surprise you what types of things can pay into the bucket. Spending time outside in your back yard could pay into your dog's bucket if they're the type vigilant about checking for stuff happening. Deliveries or people knocking at your door or ringing the doorbell can pay into the bucket. For some dogs, people or other dogs passing by the front window can add to the bucket. Predictable cues pay into the bucket. This might be something as simple as picking up your dog's leash. Do they get really excited about that? If they do, it adds to the bucket. Maybe it's taking out their food bowl, picking up your house keys or putting on your jacket. Perhaps they don't get excited about those but instead look a little sad because you're leaving them. Going on walks can pay into the bucket, especially if you go on the same route every day. Why, you might ask? Because there are lots of predictors when they go on the same route approximately the same time everyday. This could be people they meet, dogs they see or squirrels out searching for food. A change in routine can also add to the bucket. We used to say "Get your dog on a routine". We don't tell students that anymore because we've learned over the years that having your dog on a routine is, in fact, not good for them. This is because when the routine changes, it often stresses them out. Think about when things change for you or don't go as planned. Do you get frustrated, upset, stressed? For some dogs, going to the veterinarian or groomer can stress them out. We don't have that problem with our own Goldens. They love going to both places; however, remember I said that both positive and negative experiences pay into the bucket? Because our dogs love going there so much, it raises their arousal level and quickly fills their bucket. I'll touch on two more but there are in fact many more. If you have a noisy or busy home, that can



also pay into the bucket. For instance, if you have young children, they can often be noisy and busy running around. If you have teenagers who play loud music or video games, that can also pay into the bucket. The last one l'll touch on is if you have a multi-dog household ~ one dog might set the other one off adding to that dog's bucket. What sometimes happens in our house is, Star will bark at something outside, which sets off Tula who then chimes in with even more barking.

The unfortunate part about all this is once your dog's bucket overflows, it can take up to 72 hours for it to empty.

So, how can we help them empty the bucket and keep it from overflowing? One of the things we can do is help our dog learn to be calmer. This then lowers their stress or arousal level. Unfortunately, dogs don't know how to calm themselves.

One of the first things to realize is that adult dogs need a minimum of 15 hours of sleep a day. If they get 8 hours at night, they still need another 7 hours during the day. It doesn't need to be all at once. It can be broken up but rest is essential. Think about a child who doesn't get their required naps. What happens to them? They become wild animals ~ no disrespect intended. I raised 3 children and have 5 grandchildren. This might mean your dog rests in a crate, their bed or someplace where they won't be disturbed. If you have young children, they need to understand that they must not bother the dog when they're sleeping. Another thing is to provide your dog with puzzle feeders. These are toys where they have to figure out how to get the food. This is very calming and tiring for dogs. Snuffle mats and Licky Pads are also good for this. Just be sure to supervise them to make sure they don't decide to eat the mat or pad in the hopes of finding more food. A frozen Kong filled with their food or

something they enjoy or long-lasting chews are also good options. Again, be sure to supervise chews and make sure they don't try to swallow it whole as they get near the end.

Calmness is KING. A calm dog is less stressed, can think and respond, and is better behaved.






MEET & GREET

Love in Four Parts: Calvin #4155

THIS IS A STORY OF HOW LOVE AND PATIENCE CAN OVERCOME.

In the adoption process, so many people are involved from the time the intake team hears about a Golden in need to the time when the forever family takes them into their home. In Calvin's case, these are stories from several perspectives ~ the foster, the adopter, the adopter's dog Deacon, and Calvin himself.

Part 1: The Fosters

Calvin had been with us for seven weeks. He was a COVID puppy ~ one of many who present with socialization challenges. Although he had made progress during his time with us, his energy could put off even the most balanced dog. We weren't sure we'd be saying goodbye to Calvin the day his prospective family came to meet him. A neighbour's Golden gal romped happily with him, correcting him if he got too pushy, but when he found himself locked in a duel with a strong and bossy Corgi without a clue what he'd done to trigger it, he responded like a toddler with a water gun and never gave in. So, we weren't sure how Calvin would react to a new dog. Calvin's potential brother, Deacon, had had a long drive to meet him. He had just lost his canine sister and he wasn't in the mood for a crazy puppy with questionable manners. A walk down the street together was not the answer to helping them get to know each other. Deacon's humans and I had gone only a few uncomfortable blocks with the two boys loudly spitting and swearing at each other before we returned to a shady area

in the backyard to let them decompress. Each of Deacon's humans took a leash and I left them to work their magic. It had been a very rocky start and lots of people would have given up but I could see from our kitchen window that progress was being made. Thirty, then sixty, then ninety minutes had passed when I saw that both leashes were being held by one person and the dogs were no longer reacting to each other. They were lying in a relaxed state on the grass on either side of them, no evidence of the initial fear aggression that can look unresolvable. Soon after that, I watched both dogs drink out of the water bowl together at the same time without incident and I marveled at the transformation. It had been just over two hours since Deacon's humans had arrived when they decided the dogs were calm and confident enough to move to the front yard where the vehicle was parked. The car door was open, the back seat was empty, and Calvin was free to explore whenever he was ready. Several minutes passed and I saw movement. Calvin had jumped in. When he jumped out, he was adorned with his new bandana and his new name! It was a deal! He was going home. While we finalized the paperwork and celebrated the fact that just hours earlier, we couldn't bring them within yards of each other. Calvin had a chance to do some sniffs on leash in the front yard alongside his new pal. Only three hours had passed when they drove off with both boys lying beside each other in the back seat and I tearfully waved goodbye. I kissed Calvin goodbye that morning just in case it was my last chance...and it was. Once I handed him over to his new family who then patiently worked with him for three hours, an interaction with me



would have been for me, not for him. I asked them to give him a kiss for me and they have... thousands of times. A Golden has never been so lucky as to find humans who speak Golden, not English, when working with their pups. Liz



Part 2: The Adopters ~ Calvin's New Family

We've been Golden parents for many years. Loving them so completely brings deep joy to our lives. They are our whole world and there's almost nothing we don't do together. Their love story happened one day when they curled up together on the couch to sleep and we saw that they played in

the yard without fighting and would look for each other if one happened to be elsewhere. Their bond began to form and one day we realized that they truly were the best of friends. Deacon is no longer grieving, his eyes are bright again, and he's back to his old self...all because of love. Calvin's sweet personality has brought us much love and we are so happy we took a chance on him. He is a challenging little boy, but he is so smart and willing to learn. He can be silly and makes us laugh with his antics but he also looks up at us with so much love and adoration it melts our hearts. Even rough starts can be worth it. Part 4: Calvin

He was a big red dog named Deacon. I was so excited, I wanted to play. But Deacon didn't. He looked at me and his eyes were hard and sad and he wrinkled his lips and barked. I didn't understand. Didn't he want to be friends? I barked back. The humans were very nice. They petted me and took me for a walk even though I didn't know what was expected of me. My new family started teaching me things. They took me and Deacon for walks. They gave us treats, fed us great food, and bought me lots of toys. They kept telling me that I was a good boy and they loved me. But things were really rough with my brother. He just did not want to play with me. He didn't like me looking at him, smelling him or laying down beside him. He would give me a very bad look and walk away if I tried. But I really liked the humans and I liked my new home. I got to play in the backyard. Deacon and I would fight. He would try to take my stick away and I didn't want him to. I would bark and make faces. We never bit each other but we sure made a lot of noise and put on a big show. My human mother would tell us to play nice with each other and to remember we are brothers and we were a family that loves. Then one night I didn't have to sleep in my house. I got to sleep wherever I wanted and I crawled on the bed with all three of them. I thought he would make a face and walk away but he didn't. He stayed there and went to sleep. I slowly got closer until our warm bodies were touching. It was a very good night. Suddenly things were very different. Deacon stopped barking at and fighting with me. He let me sleep beside him and play with toys. When we went outside, he would run around with me. I would chase him and I think he liked that a lot. We would sniff things and explore the backyard together. I think I understand what it means to be brothers now. A brother is somebody who lives with you, plays with you, and shares his toys with

you. A brother is someone you can trust and love. I'm glad my foster mother taught me what trust meant. It's a wonderful feeling! The Happy Ending

Calvin's story is the perfect example of the 3/3/3 Rule and the reason we need to give our new adopted Goldens time to adjust. It took Calvin's wonderful foster family time to figure out Calvin's needs. It took time for Calvin's family to really get him comfortable in his new home. It took time for Calvin's brother Deacon to grieve over his lost sister and accept Calvin. And it took time for Calvin himself to understand what his new life was all about. In the adoption process, we all need to remember the 3/3/3 Rule. If you haven't seen it, here it is...





THE 3/3/3 RULE IT DOESN'T HAPPEN OVERNIGHT

The 3/3/3 Rule is a general guideline for the adjustment period of your new Golden. After adopting, every Golden is unique and will adjust differently.

It is a troubling fact that thousands of dogs are abandoned, surrendered, unwanted, and neglected each year for no other reason than some kind of inconvenience. Golden Rescue alone has found forever families for thousands of Goldens and the need continues to grow. Volunteers work tirelessly to take in, assess, foster, heal, and re-home approximately 400 Goldens each and every year.



3 DAYS TO DECOMPRESS

- May feel overwhelmed/scared/unsure
- Not comfortable enough to show their true personality
- May pant and pace & not eat or drink
- Shuts down or hides under furniture
- May have bathroom accidents
- May not know your language/commands
- If coming from overseas, may be extremely tired & out-of-synch (long flight & time change)
- Will come to you when comfortable (let them chill & don't push it)



3 WEEKS TO LEARN YOUR ROUTINE

- Starts settling in
- Feels more comfortable
- Realizes they may be with their forever family
- Figures out the environment
- Gets into a routine
- Lets their guard down to show their true personality
- Behaviour issues may start to appear & they may start to test boundaries



3 MONTHS TO START TO FEEL AT HOME

- Finally feels comfortable with their family
- Begins to build trust and a true bond
- Gains a complete sense of security
- Settles into a routine
- Shows love and gratitude



CFIA BAN UPDATE

WE WOULD LIKE TO SHARE SOME UPDATES REGARDING THE CFIA BAN.

Firstly, the parliamentary petition calling to amend the heartless CFIA ban on most international dog rescue was presented to Parliament with 20,630 verified signatures. Thank you for signing the petition!

We have also formed a group called the International Rescue Coalition of Canada with other rescue organizations across Canada, with the objective of collaborating with the CFIA to identify and implement protocols to enable us to resume rescue from countries in dire need of our help.

Additionally, thanks to your support, we launched a successful campaign to request face-to-face meetings with Members of Parliament, to share our perspective and maintain awareness of this critical issue. Through this campaign, we have received invaluable support, advice, and even a glimmer of hope!

Although the path ahead is evolving and uncertain, we remain steadfast in our mission, and will never give up!

We will continue to adjust our approach until we successfully collaborate with the CFIA to amend the ban, allowing international rescue to continue while keeping Canadians and their pets safe from rabies.

We encourage you to keep an eye out for our upcoming eblasts regarding the CFIA ban and our







to GR to fill the big hole that Churros left behind; however, we were actually living in Sweden by then. Golden Rescue found us Gino in Cairo. I flew from Sweden






Leo #3669 LOVE AT FIRST C(LICK)!
