Save a life...Help us amend the CFIA ban!

WHAT: A peaceful RALLY to amend the CFIA ban WHEN: Saturday, May 4th ~ noon to 2 pm

WHERE: CFIA offices in Ottawa

The CFIA may well believe that we have given up the fight against the ban; however, we have to advocate for thousands of dogs who live in misery and who have no voice.

For many of us who have rescued an international Golden, we know how important it was to give these amazing creatures a second chance at life (read many of the stories **here**.)

This ban is sentencing thousands of dogs to a life of misery and, more than likely, death. We need your help by joining our rally to bring life back to this issue. We are hoping for 100+ people and the main intent, besides getting the CFIA's attention, is to invite and attract the media. Our plan is to make this rally as friendly as our Goldens. We want to educate not irritate.

Our first priority is to rescue every Canadian Golden who crosses our radar. Since we believe that rescue has no borders and we live in one world, we would like to continue our rescue efforts with our shelter partners in Turkey and Egypt when we have adopters and the financial means to do so.

We agree with creating stronger protocols. We are not advocating for the ban to be reversed...just amended to something reasonable. Since rabies is 100% preventable, the easiest way to ensure dogs are adequately vaccinated is to do a titer test in the originating country or here upon arrival. We are willing to work with the CFIA to develop a plan that will keep all Canadians safe; however, staying silent and doing nothing is not the answer. Countless dogs are suffering around the world. Canadians have always been known to be helpful and nice. This ban is VERY un-Canadian!

Rescuing international Goldens does not contribute in any way to Canada's shelter problem as any Golden who needs to be returned (and those are very few) comes back to us. In fact, we also take Goldens from Canadian shelters.

Please bring your dog ~ Golden, non-Golden, rescue, non-rescue...as long as they are friendly and will be at ease in a crowd.

It is vital we get your RSVP as we need to determine if we're going to proceed. Once we receive everyone's commitment, we will confirm all the details with you. Prior to the rally, we'll


have a Zoom call with everyone. We will also be ordering t-shirts for all participants and bandanas for the dogs.



DEAR APRIL: COULD YOU TELL ME WHETHER CANNED FOOD OR KIBBLE IS BETTER? JENNY

Dear Jenny: After hours of research, my mommy found that canned food can be better for some of my friends and it typically contains more protein plus fewer carbohydrates. It also typically contains fewer synthetic preservatives. Canned food can be good for dieting, dental issues, and my senior friends. Kibble can be better for teeth in that it doesn't adhere to our teeth like canned food. There are also options with kibble in terms of ingredients. Freeze-dried kibble has good ingredients and water can be added to soften the food. There is a greater convenience to kibble and refrigeration is not required. Kibble can contain a variety of synthetic preservatives. One must research the ingredients in all food products and get a better understanding of what your four-legged family member needs. Some recommended ingredients are Vitamin C, Vitamin E, real meats, wild caught fish, and grain free and rosemary preservatives. Ingredients to avoid are names you can't pronounce, meat and meat meal. farmed anything, white flour, and BHA/BHT. There are far too many objectionable ingredients to list and a good understanding is required.

DEAR APRIL: DO YOU HAVE A BEST DOG BISCUIT RECIPE? MARLEY

Dear Marley: There are many recipes for us.

I really like the one that has all my favourite ingredients. It has whole wheat flour, eggs, canned pumpkin, peanut butter without xylitol or any artificial sweetener, salt, and cinnamon. It is an 'ALLRECIPES' recipe and it's called 'Home-Made Dog Treats ~ Peanut Butter & Pumpkin. A google search of homemade dog treats will guide you through the lengthy prep and cooking instructions. Another fabulous recipe from 'LOVE OF COOKING' is frozen peanut butter and banana dog treats. It's a very easy recipe with three ingredients and it's ideal for warm summer days. It consists of peanut butter, banana, and Greek plain unsweetened yogurt. Make sure the ingredients are chosen for their nutritional value and good for my fur-friends.

HI APRIL: WITH SUMMER COMING, COULD YOU RECOMMEND A GOOD SUN SCREEN FOR DOGS? SONNY

Hello Sonny: With summer coming, we're going to be out in the sun a lot so it's a great idea that those with short hair, bald spots, surgical incisions, and light-coloured noses have some protection when outdoors. There are a few brands that offer protection for light colour noses. They are Burt's Bees Paw and Nose lotion and My Dog Nose It. Just be careful with ingredients. Never use a sunscreen designed for humans. The best food to help with ultra-violet rays are whole foods, raw meat, red fruits, cooked tomatoes, and green chlorophyll. Like my human families, staying out of the sun from 11 am to 1 pm is a great idea. Have a great summer and stay safe.

HELLO APRIL: IS THERE A RIGHT OR WRONG WAY TO PET A FURBABY? GEORGIE

Hi Georgie: Well Georgie, I'm so glad you asked that question. So many humans pat me on the top of my head and I don't like it. What I really like is soft touches to the neck, gentle scratches at the

base of my tail, and rubs from the top of my head to my tail in the direction of my fur. I also love when you gently massage my ears. If I'm nervous or upset, my mom will massage all of my body going with the fur. Sometimes, my friends like their paws rubbed...I don't. My favourite of all time that puts me to sleep is a heavenly tummy rub. It's a great way to bond, relax, and show affection.






What to do When an Off-Leash Dog Charges at You

Most of us think of dogs as sweet, kind, and gentle animals who only want to love and play. And while this is the case for many domesticated dogs, we often forget that dogs are not only our best friend, but they are also animals who possess sharp teeth and were once wild and still have predatory instincts that can lead to problems. Sadly, there are many fearful dogs out there who develop aggressive behaviours either because of a lack of socialization or having a rough beginning ~ perhaps a victim of an attack or mistreated by bad humans.

Recently, several dog maulings in Toronto have been reported, which has led to proposed government legislation on creating an aggressive dog registry along with other more stringent rules and regulations for owners of dogs deemed dangerous. One of the most important parts of this proposal, from a dog trainer's perspective, is the need for more education and prevention. Education for everyone ~ whether you own a dog or not is key to equip people with the tools and techniques that they can use to protect themselves should they ever be in a situation where they are being charged by an aggressive dog.

It is easy to understand the plight of someone who has been attacked or has had their dog attacked by a random dog. The fear that you feel in that moment is frightening and the trauma can last for years, so here are some tips and techniques to use should you find yourself in such a terrifying scenario. The first thing you need to do is breathe. Breathing is more essential to your state-of-mind than you can imagine.



When you're afraid, your heart rate quickens and you instantly start breathing faster, just like prey animals. And because dogs are predators, they can sense fear and hear the rapid breathing of prey animals so you don't want to make yourself appear like one or you will be treated as such. It is completely understandable that anyone being attacked by a dog who is snarling, growling, and/or barking will freeze. To save yourself in that moment though, you need to do the exact opposite. The best thing you can do is remain

calm and stand your ground. Never run away from the dog because it will only fuel their aggression and make them want to chase you more. Dogs live to chase and if you give them a reason to chase you, they will. Instead, if an aggressive dog ever comes charging at you, you need to gather up every ounce of your courage and immediately take a giant step towards them putting your arm straight out in front of you with your palm facing the dog. The palm of your hand should block the dogs gaze so that they are not able to make eve contact with you. Stand tall, holding your stance and your posture stiff and at the same time tell the dog in a deep and very loud voice "NOOOO" or "STOP"! Make yourself as big and as loud as possible when the dog is charging so they think twice. Doing this instantly stops their forward momentum and the dog will stop charging and rethink their attack. This is because when a dog is charging you it expects you to turn and run. In its mind they are the predator and you are the prey but when you step towards them holding out your arm and yelling in a loud authoritative voice, it is confusing to them because you are not what they expect and now they must pause and reassess their actions.

As predators, dogs are opportunists and aggressive dogs are looking for an easy target. Once challenged, they will often back down and reassess their attack plan. Often, they will stop short and form a perimeter around you of about ten feet and will circle you looking for an opening and deciding whether they want to continue. Hold your stance keeping your arm out with palm up facing the dog even if they circle around you, leaning your body towards them so



that you are moving in a circle with them. And if they take another step towards you, again use a deep guttural NOOOO moving your arm and hand out towards them again, holding yourself stiff showing the dog you are not easy prey. This should stop them in their tracks because they decide the fight is not worth it and you won't be so easily overpowered. Once you are no longer acting like the victim, they stop treating you like one and will reassess their actions. Every time this has happened to me and my staff, and it has happened a number of times, we use this very technique, and the dog eventually retreats, perhaps to look for an easier target.

If you have a dog with you when you are charged, then use one hand to grab your dog's leash and pull it behind you, offering your dog some protection from the charging dog. Then use your other hand and the same technique described above to stop the charging dog. Don't let your fear rule your head, don't panic, stand firm, and the dog will back off when they see this behaviour from you. If the dog is coming to attack your dog, typically it doesn't even see you until you make this maneuver. Once you use this technique, the dog realizes that there are two of you that they

will have to face off against and that it's actually two against one now instead of one-on-one and in the animal kingdom that's a whole different set of odds.

One final thing to mention is that if you are the owner of a dog that shows aggressive behaviour, it is up to you to learn techniques to control that behaviour, so the dog learns how to greet people and dogs properly when on a walk or at home. These behaviours can be quite scary and owners facing such issues with their dogs should seek professional help to facilitate the transition away from aggression as fast as possible. Obviously, everyone who has a dog with these tendencies should be walking their dog on a leash or gentle leader at all times and they need to learn how to control their dog on the leash. This can all be learned by working with a professional dog trainer skilled in these methods.


Mylie #4507
