OUR RESCUE MISSION OF

A story of courage, hope, and possibility

More than 1,000 Goldens have fallen on hard times in Istanbul, Turkey. Some of these gentle souls are living in shelters, while others are on the streets, trying to survive in conditions that are challenging and harsh. For 25 years, Golden Rescue's reach has extended primarily throughout Ontario and Quebec; however, when we learned about the desperate situation in Istanbul, we knew we wanted to help and thankfully, were equipped to do so. With appropriate resources and processes in place and a vast number of loving families eager to welcome these beauties into their home, we were ready to step in. In December 2015, we officially launched our Rescue Mission of Love, bringing four Istanbul Goldens to Ontario and Quebec, knowing there would be more to follow.

To date, 39 Goldens from Istanbul have landed gently into the arms of their Canadian forever families, making snow angels for the first time, revelling in play with cats and kids, and learning to trust the humans who love them. And since rescuing these sweethearts, we've heard time and again from gracious forever families about the symbiotic rescue effect they've felt, saying, "I rescued him, and he rescued me right back."

It's been a remarkable journey so far and we're planning to share many more stories along the way as we continue to bring more Istanbul Goldens to Canada. But before we move forward, we're taking a moment to look back on how it all began ~ to glimpse into the hearts of the people who have been touched by this extraordinary experience and to learn more about the Goldens whose lives have been changed forever.

Revelation in Turkey

Recently, I travelled to Istanbul, Turkey, with Viive Tamm, Chair of Golden Rescue's Board of Directors, on a personally-funded trip to do our due diligence and see for ourselves the situation that we had heard so much about. It was a trip that neither of us will ever forget; however, in the style of the great Douglas Adams, I will assure you that this story is a happy one, and that Turkey is doing an incredible job of managing a problem of unimaginable scale and caring for a significant stray dog population.

We had a lot of questions when we first arrived and had arranged for our contact, Edna, to guide us through some shelters.

I will skip the details of the first dinner with Edna on Sunday night and will save the flavours of the little fried fish we had for another publication, except to say that Edna was a wonderful hostess. We got to know each other over that dinner and over the next two days as we visited some shelters.

Our first stop was at a 'pensione' or what we would call a boarding kennel ~ a privately run home for dogs that also serves as a holding facility for Goldens destined for a new life. Some of the dogs had just arrived and others were headed for Atlanta (as the U.S. has been rescuing Istanbul Goldens for a while).

The first boy we met was Jake ~ overweight, matted, and smelly. We fell in love with him instantly and decided to claim him, seeing a beautiful Golden through his tangles and chubbiness. We also met Adelle and Rosie, two of the Goldens we eventually booked onto our own flight, and what sweeties they were. Healthy, happy, and wiggly Adelle was in need of a diet and Rosie had perfected her jumping skills. They seemed to love the Benny Bullys we provided and we were proud to put Golden Rescue collars on them as a first step toward a new beginning.

Then it was time to visit another shelter where we saw a large enclosure that housed about 30 Goldens. Through the fence, we were able to pat them and give them some instant love. One boy, who didn't greet us, had been at the shelter a very long time. We were told he had lost hope of being adopted, so he didn't join his shelter-mates at the fence when humans came by. Instantly, we named him Bob Hope and he was now part of the Golden Rescue posse headed for Canada. This particular shelter occupied approximately five acres, with several styles of enclosures ~ those near the entrance were approximately 20ft by 20ft, with around 5-10 dogs roaming in each area. We could see that each dog had its own house



with fresh water and food. We heard lots of barking, but also saw a lot of tail wagging. Running loose in the compound were others. Almost all were relatively well fed and we learned that they had been given necessary vaccinations, had been cared for medically, and were spayed or neutered.

We then headed down an aisle between two long rows of large pens each about 20ft by 50ft. Each enclosure contained about 20 dogs, seemingly sorted by temperament or breed. The Goldens we were going to see were housed toward the end of the enclosure, but before we reached them, we passed a group of tail-wagging tripods, barking for attention. We also passed two kennels ~ one housing small mixed breeds, the other, large mixed breeds. A third kennel was home to a number of Husky types. We estimated that about 2-3,000 dogs lived in this shelter. We named and claimed three more Goldens, all with sweet, loving personalities. It was difficult not claiming all of them!

Leaving the shelter that day, Viive and I were quite the sight ~ each of us gently guiding a Golden to a better life. Bob Hope, on Viive's leash, had come to life somehow knowing he'd been sprung from the shelter, and Happy, who lived up to his name, his head held high was a delight to walk toward a world that would be filled with joy and love.



The Goldens in our care were signed out and transported to the pensione with the others and we headed home, exhausted from an emotionally draining day, somewhat stinky, but feeling elated.

Viive and I enjoyed a night on the town (I will spare you the juicy details, except to say that were back at the hotel by 9 p.m.) and the next morning, we were off on more doggy-discoveries.

The first stop was another pensione, where we were reunited with Adelle and Rosie and where we met Limon and Tokyo (good luck telling them apart, Golden Rescue team!) and a few others. While Edna worked, we just played with the six Goldens in the yard. Hard work, right?

That day, we drove to another municipal shelter where we were warmly greeted by Dr. Önder Oflazoglu, who shared some interesting facts with us:

The shelter was the newest in the city ~ a prototype for many new shelters to be built in the coming years. Incredibly, the roads are built in two-toned paving stones, the fences an elaborate design, and the kennels have radiant floor heating.

The total size is about 50 acres, with a capacity for about 5,000 dogs.

Most of these dogs would be contained in quarter houses, which are houses inside fenced yards, each of which had 20 huts inside. The majority of the huts were empty.

There are 80 staff on-site, including several surgeons.

In 2004, Turkey introduced new laws banning euthanasia except in medical cases. This means that the dogs in the street and in shelters need to be carefully managed and the main aim of Istanbul's dog program is to vaccinate, spay/neuter, and release to reduce the population over time.

These shelters seem to be increasingly well funded by the local government.

While Turkey's stray dog population is daunting to manage, it was clear that this country is admirably trying to look for new and better ways to deal with this issue. And it was also clear that the well-being of each and every dog is at the heart of everything they do.

As we departed Istanbul, with Rosie, Limon, Adelle, and Tokyo safely on board our flight, Viive and I were filled with hope and energized by the possibility of rescuing more...and more. We knew that our mission had just begun.





































Feeling 'Lucky'

I went to New York City to get Lucky and lucky I was! This was one of the most rewarding, fun, exciting, stressful, and emotionally-charged expeditions I have ever experienced. I know how much work went into coordinating all the people, pups, and planes and I want to thank everyone that made it all possible. For those of us who were fortunate enough to make the trip, we felt instant gratification at the moment we saw 18 happy Goldens arrive safely ~ tails wagging and eager to greet us. Well, I found it ~ the sense of euphoria I experienced as a result of this operation. I cannot wait for the chance to do it all again. I would even go through the hassle we had at Canada Customs! This is the secret to happiness: be a dog and if you can't be a dog, help a dog be a dog.

THE JFK CONVOY

She kept trying to manoeuver her way to the front seat to see what was going on ~ such a curious sweetie. We shared our story with everyone who asked, both on the drive down and on the way back. Hotel staff, waiters, and even the customs officers were supportive, kind, and very interested in our unique rescue mission. It was an amazing experience!





Bucket List – Revised

Sophie is doing great. She's a social butterfly and simply melts hearts wherever she goes. Her tail is in perpetual motion and she's affectionate beyond words. It didn't take long for Sophie to take over most of my queensize bed at night. Is that wrong? However, I also seem to have lost my favourite Lazy Boy as Sophie finds it quite comfortable. Whatever Sophie wants, Sophie seems to get. Maybe I should rename her Lola! While I started this journey as a foster-to-adopt, it took only a second to realize that there was no need to foster at all. I knew instantly that I wanted to adopt my gorgeous girl when she was released from her travelling crate. Sophie is my family...and this is the story of how she rescued me. The trip to NYC was not uneventful. With all the focus on dog bowls, treats, toys, leashes, directions, hotel reservations, and international doggy paperwork, there were some forgotten passports and a driver's licence to make for a tricky border crossing. And this might also be a good time to mention that a few vehicles in our convoy inadvertently found themselves in the EZ Pass lane, allowing for an unauthorized mad dash into the US. We can laugh about it now. Next, our convoy of 11 vehicles all seemed to take turns getting lost in NYC. Even Ethel, my GPS, had a nervous breakdown and I cannot repeat the names I called 'her' when 'she' let me down. But it was all soon forgotten when we arrived at the JFK airport hangar, overcome by waves of emotion as we waited for the first Golden bundles to be brought out of the hangar.

We could hear them 'talking' before we could see them which only ignited the electricity and excitement in the air. My Sophie was the second to come out of her crate and it was at the precise moment when I took her leash that I fell in love. I cried like I hadn't in years and I basked in this life-changing moment that I will never, ever forget. We were both rescues, safely delivered into each other's lives and we now had our first memory. It struck me hard how much planning, effort, and coordination on behalf of Golden Rescue went into this mission and how grateful I was. Arriving back at the hotel, our group was re-energized, now in charge of 18 Golden sweethearts who just wanted to play in the parking lot at 2 a.m. After a bit of sleep with the Goldens on our hotel beds, we were on the road again, headed for Canada. Crossing the border into Canada didn't go quite as planned and after a 3.5-hour delay to explain to the nice customs folks why 18 Turkish Goldens who had landed in the U.S. were now heading to Canada, we were on our way home. Finally! I recently told one of your volunteers that after my trip to NYC, I revisited my bucket list. This adventure was exhilarating. With twists and turns, ups and downs, tears and laughter, where we held our breath as the Goldens arrived in crates on a skid, happy and safe ~ it was a spectacular occasion. Who gets to do that in a lifetime? I did. And for that reason, it went on the top of my bucket list with a proud declaration of 'DID THAT' beside it.


Annie #2272

- Shipping needed resources to Primes on an as-needed basis (including brochures and new inventory)


