

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

# ...Rescue the Mistreated...







If you were to wander the streets of Istanbul, Cairo, or Mexico City, you would likely shout those words out loud. However, shouting won't do a thing, other than add to the noise. Golden Rescue has visited these places and decided to do something to help. While we often feel our efforts are like a drop in the ocean compared to the problem, we do what we can and have given 500+ international Goldens a second chance. Perhaps just as importantly, we have given the amazing, exhausted, tireless volunteer angels in these countries hope ~ and believe us, they need all the hope they can get.

### Dr. Robert Anthony said:

"Hope is the expectation that something outside of ourselves, something external, is going to come to our rescue."

We, at Golden Rescue, are in constant contact with these street angels so we are well-versed on the problems they face every day. However, it occurred to us that many of you have little knowledge of our International Rescue Mission of Love and have questions. Here are a few that we have been asked that might help you understand what we are trying to do and what's involved.

# Why did you start the International Rescue Mission of Love?

Three years ago, we were approached by rescue-minded volunteers in Istanbul to see if we could help rescue abandoned Goldens from their streets. Five U.S. rescue groups were already helping them and they wondered if Canada might join the rescue mission. Turkey has had a long history of strays and they are a part of their culture. A number of years ago, Golden Retrievers were introduced into their society and they quickly became a status symbol. However, when the economy faltered, many of these Goldens were simply abandoned on the streets and in the forests. to fend for themselves. Goldens, unlike some other breeds, do not fare well on the street ~ they are typically not aggressive enough and subsequently suffered more than some other breeds. Two of our board members visited Istanbul to observe firsthand what was going on and it was this visit that convinced us to get involved. https://www. goldenrescue.ca/category/at-golden-rescue/ rescue-mission-of-love/

If you haven't already, you might want to read the story of Golden Rescue's trip to

Cairo (https://www.goldenrescue.ca/2019/02/international-mission-of-love/). That was an eye-opening experience for two Golden Rescue board members.

Since then, Golden Rescue has been inundated with calls from rescue volunteers in other countries, but for us to help, we must have feet-on-the-street in those countries, which Turkey, Egypt, and Mexico have.

# When you rescue internationally, how does that impact the Goldens who need rescuing in Canada?

Simply put, it doesn't! Our international efforts complement our mission here at home. Domestic rescuing will always take precedence and we are actively expanding in Canada. In fact, our international rescue efforts have garnered so much publicity that it has helped put Golden Rescue on the map nationally. Right now, we have adopters in almost every province and although we are predominantly in Ontario and Quebec, our profile has increased dramatically and our long-term goal is to be a national rescue organization with foster families throughout the country.



# ...Save the Injured...







## What is your process to bring Goldens into Canada from other countries?

We can only help countries where there are dedicated volunteers in the country who are organized, funded, and educated in the rescue process. These street angels do the heavy lifting. Our job, although difficult at times, is small in relation to what these international volunteers must do. They rescue the dogs predominantly from the streets or forests. They put them in their own shelters, and then, if necessary, nurse them back to health. We work very closely with these rescue partners to ensure we are aware of any health concerns in the dogs selected to come to Canada. Goldens are checked by a veterinarian and tested for things like leishmania, and they must attest that they are in relatively good health prior to being approved to travel. Soon after they arrive in Canada, the Goldens are vet-checked again to ensure they meet Canadian health standards. If additional treatment is needed, our Director of Golden Care works closely with our veterinarian partners to develop a plan of care. We are always working to ensure the safety, health, and well-being of the Goldens and humans involved, both here and abroad.

# How do you determine which Goldens come to Canada?

We have met, in person, with the rescuers in Istanbul and Cairo and we trust our rescue partners implicitly. They know we will not take Goldens with contagious diseases or aggressive Goldens. They send us information and photos of Goldens they would like us to consider and we review and approve the ones we believe we can place. In the true spirit of rescue, we also take some who need medical attention if we know we can help them.

How do you know a potential adopter might be interested in an international Golden?

We recently added a question to the adoption application, "Would you consider adopting an international Golden?" So far, more than 90% have answered "yes", so we know we have willing adopters for international Goldens. If we are unable to help potential adopters, many will turn to other sources or unknowingly buy from a puppy mill or backyard breeder...and that doesn't help the homeless pet situation. At any given time, we have 1,000+ adoption applications so no matter what we do, we will disappoint some families.

## How easy is it to find adopters for the international Goldens?

There are many Golden angels out there. In the true spirit of rescue, most are open to adopting a domestic or international Golden, as a Golden in need is a Golden in need. We have had no trouble finding homes for blind or three-legged Goldens either. It is very heartwarming when people step up to rescue one of our Goldens with special needs.

### What does the \$900 adoption fee cover?


It covers medical care, neutering (in most cases), vaccinations, tests, microchips, crates, airline fees, and initial vet fees in Canada. Our average cost per Golden to go through our program (international or domestic) is approximately \$1,700. The adoption fee only covers a portion of this. This is why fundraising efforts are so critical to our ability to help as many Goldens as possible.


# What does Golden Rescue do to ensure these international Goldens don't put people or our domestic pets at risk?

Before travelling to Canada, the international Goldens are in our partner shelters for a

number of months, so although they aren't technically quarantined, they are under observation. They are thoroughly vet-checked and treated for anything worrisome and we test for contagious diseases like leishmania or anything common to the region. They are also vaccinated for rabies, kennel cough, distemper, and are treated for fleas and given Interceptor (de-wormer for tape, round, hook, and whip worms). Recently, we sent a shipment of Nexgard to Cairo for travelling Goldens to ensure fleas/ticks are killed prior to travelling. All international Goldens are vet-checked within a few days of arrival and given a full wellness exam, which includes bloodwork and a fecal test. If anything untoward is discovered, we treat them immediately. We have done our due diligence and we trust our rescue partners in Istanbul, Cairo, and Mexico City. In fact, our Board members visited Istanbul and Cairo personally to visit the shelters and meet with our rescue partners to ensure their credibility.

# How are you addressing health concerns, such as canine flu, distemper, rabies, brucellosis, etc.?

We aren't currently bringing any Goldens from

the areas with reported outbreaks of canine flu and/or brucellosis. All the Goldens coming to us are vet-checked and given a rabies and distemper vaccine prior to being approved for travel to Canada.

# How is the health of the international Goldens arriving in Canada?

In general terms, no better or worse than the Goldens we help from Canada. Some have injured limbs but very few have major medical issues. In Canada, we will rescue a Golden with serious health issues if the Golden can be saved. If there are any serious conditions discovered with the international Goldens, we would not transport them here... rather they would be treated in their own country first.

# How are most of the Goldens behaviourally?

Most of them are extraordinarily sweet and have adjusted to their new families beautifully. Some have had behavioural issues like food guarding, domination or a high prey drive. With time, patience, and love, they have become happy, well-adjusted family members. Again, we have not seen more behavioural issues in the international Goldens than the domestic Goldens we rescue. We are a rescue group and we deal with behavioural issues all the time. In fact, it is our biggest cost after vet care. We believe that every Golden who comes into our care deserves a second chance and other than aggression (i.e. remorse-less biting), we will do everything possible to help our Goldens live a happy and safe life.

# Where do Goldens go when they arrive in Canada?

Canada does not require animals to be quarantined, so they go directly to their foster-to-adopt (FTA) families. We decided right from the beginning to find adoptive families for each international Golden. With all they have been through in their lives, including living in a cage or kennel, we didn't want to house them temporarily with foster families only to be uprooted again in a few weeks. The intent of the FTA family is to adopt them; however, we give the FTA family a week or so to determine if they're a good fit. What these Goldens need (in addition to good food and lots of love) is stability and to feel safe.

# What is the difference between a foster family and a foster-to-adopt (FTA) family?

Foster families foster ~ a temporary setting where we can assess the Golden's health, behaviour, and make an informed opinion on what forever family would be the best fit. FTA families have the intention of adopting the Golden. We are careful to place Goldens with FTA families so that they have the best possible chance of success; however, despite our best efforts, a few have been returned and re-homed.

# What is the adoption success rate with FTA families?

Over 90% of FTA placements lead to successful adoptions. Some have to be moved to find more suitable families (i.e. issues with cats). Are the Goldens sedated before they travel?

No, we want them to be fully alert and able to move quickly and easily so they will land properly on their legs if they hit any

turbulence during the flight. Research tells us that animals can be injured during a flight if they're sedated. We know the flight is a traumatic experience for them, but we believe one more day of unpleasantness is a small price to pay for a happily-ever-after.

# What is the process for clearance through Canada Customs?

Golden Rescue is required to supply Canada Customs with the appropriate paperwork. Sometimes a Border Services veterinarian will take extra time to examine their passports or check out the dogs as part of the clearance process.

## How are the Goldens transported to Canada?

Some travel to Canada on a cargo plane and we have transported 10-34 dogs on a cargo flight. Many come here accompanied by flight parents ~ travellers who are willing to bring Goldens along with them. Either way, our rescue partners in Turkey, Egypt, and Mexico prepare them for the flight (i.e. getting them medically checked and tested, microchipped, passports in order, etc.). They transport them

in person to the airport, exercise them before putting them into crates, and check them in for their flight. Our volunteers and the vast majority of our adoptive families meet them upon arrival with open arms...and their new lives begin.

# Killing our Goldens with Kindness

We all love our Goldens...of course we do. They bring such endless joy and unconditional love to our lives and it's difficult to remember what life was like without them. We take care of them and, in many ways, they take care of us. We want nothing but the best for them because, after all, they are our fur-babies. But did you know that we may be killing them with love? Overfeeding and giving frequent treats is putting them into an early grave when their lives are already too short. However, many of us don't know what is too much especially when we gauge it by our Goldens. It's really hard to resist those big brown eyes when all they want is more food and another treat and they always appear to be hungry. And we give them more because more equals love, right? This is not the case. Overfeeding can lead to a host of problems and health issues if not corrected, including obesity, diabetes, arthritis, breathing problems, and hip dysplasia. This, in turn, can lead to more vet and medication costs, which really isn't the main issue here. If overfed, Goldens also run the risk of gaining weight too quickly. So how can you tell if your Golden is overweight? One way is to physically exam him/her. If you can easily feel their ribs (without seeing them) and there is a visible waistline behind the chest, your Golden is likely an ideal weight. However, if the ribs are covered by a thick pad of fat or the waist isn't visible, these are signs that they are overweight. Other signs include mobility issues and lack of energy. The other way to determine if your dog is overweight is to visit your veterinarian and ask them, point blank, what your Golden's ideal weight should be. Before you go, you may want to keep a record of what, how much, and how many times a day you feed your Golden, including all treats and table scraps. This will help give your vet all the information required to determine if changes need to be made, suggested serving sizes, and feeding frequency. It is important to stick to this ideal weight as closely as possible and to tell friends/family members not to overindulge your Golden. It is up to you to control what your Golden consumes and the amount of exercise he/she gets. Withholding food/treats from your Golden may seem cruel, but being descendants of predators, they can withstand long periods without food. They won't starve if you cut back on the quantity. It is important for their overall well-being and health and may potentially prolong their life. We all want as much time as possible with our fur-babies!

# **TICK ALERT: Golden Owners Beware**

With the arrival of warm weather comes the arrival of an annoying and possibly fatal pest ~ the tick.

What was once considered a nuisance found only in the wooded countryside has been persistently and increasingly invading cities both large and small. Now ticks can be as close as your neighbourhood park or your neighbour's backyard.

What, precisely, is a tick? A tick is a fairly common, external parasite that embeds itself in the skin of both animals and humans. Once it lands, it inserts its mouthparts into the skin and feeds on the blood. And that single tick has the potential to pass on multiple diseases.

Four species of ticks reside in Canada: Brown Dog Tick, Western Black Legged Tick, American Dog Tick, and Lone Star Tick. The most common tick in southern Ontario is the American Dog Tick which is considered to be a danger to dogs wherever woodlands exist. While all ticks are capable of carrying various diseases, it's the Western Black Legged Tick that's responsible for the transmission of Lyme disease which both animals and humans can contract.

Areas in Ontario known to have ticks carrying Lyme disease now include Long Point Provincial Park on the northwest shore of Lake Erie, Turkey Point Provincial Park on the northwest shore of Lake Erie, Rondeau

Provincial Park on the north shore of Lake Erie, Point Pelee National Park on the north shore of Lake Erie, Pinery Provincial Park on the southeast shore of Lake Huron, Rouge Valley/Rouge Park on the east side of the GTA, Prince Edward Point National Wildlife Area on the northeast shore of Lake Ontario, and Wainfleet Bog Conservation Area on the Niagara Peninsula. Lyme-infected ticks are becoming more common in the Rainy River area of northwestern Ontario.

Prevention and early detection are the best ways of protecting your Golden against Lyme disease. The intent is to stop it before any symptoms appear. Should the disease progress, symptoms can include stiff, painful, and swollen joints and a limp that comes and goes, often appearing to switch sides. Some Goldens may have an arched back and a stiff walk. More serious, however, are fever, difficulty breathing, and kidney failure, while heart and neurological problems are rarer.

To help protect your Golden, there are countless preventatives available on the market that stop ticks BEFORE they bite, killing, not only all of the major tick species, but acting as a flea treatment as well. Always consult your vet first; however, before purchasing any of these products or starting any form of medical treatment on your own.

When bitten, the skin of some pets may


become red and irritated around the site, while others may not even notice the parasite attached to them. It's imperative that you inspect your pet thoroughly when returning from areas known for ticks.

Should you find a tick, it must be removed very carefully to ensure that the mouthparts are fully removed. If left behind, they can abscess and cause an infection. Kill the tick by placing it in a zip-lock bag and pouring rubbing alcohol over it. For the uncertain owner, special tick removal devices are available, while the squeamish can have their vet remove the tick instead.

Some experts now advise that when your Golden is tested annually for heartworm disease, the same test should include screening for Lyme disease, ehrlichiosis, and anaplasmosis (both bacterial infections). A positive test result enables you to start treating your pet early ~ before the onset of any symptoms.

Never was the expression "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" truer than in the case of tick prevention.


### MEET & GREET ~ Dara #2967

My name is Sadie #2963 and I hope to provide you the same excellent advice that Goldie had. Looks like I have some big shoes to fill! For those of you who don't know me, I came from Istanbul in January 2019 and settled in with a nice family in Carlisle, Ontario. My mom describes me as sweet, cuddly, and a bit head strong at times and I love my stuffies ~ so much so, that sometimes the stitching comes out... oops. I recently had the mascot of a local pet food store named after me...yay! If you have any questions, please let me know and I'll be happy to help!

### Dear Sadie: Lately, I've been sneezing and itching a lot more than normal. Should I see my vet? Scratchy Sam

Dear Sam: Allergies can be caused by either food or the environment and can have similar symptoms ranging from itchiness, sneezing, hair loss, swollen paws, and skin or ear infections. Seasonal allergies such as those caused by pollen or fresh cut grass typically occur during certain times of the year, whereas food (grains, soy, beef, wheat) and environmental allergies (dust, mold, cleaning chemicals) can happen any time. It wouldn't hurt to have your vet check you out and possibly run some tests to rule out skin mites, fungal infections or endocrine issues, such as hypothyroidism or Cushing's Disease. At the very least, you will find out what is causing your discomfort. Good luck!

Dear Sadie: I'm new to my house and it looks like there's a pool in the backyard. Once the weather is warmer, I would love to jump in the water! Is there anything I should know before I do? Rex

Dear Rex: There are a few things to consider before you take that dip. First of all, make sure you know how to swim. If you don't know how to swim, have someone teach you (your mom, dad, siblings or even a dog trainer), including how to exit the pool in case you ever accidentally fall in. If you still can't get the hang of it, consider wearing a life vest made specifically for dogs to ensure your safety while you enjoy your water time. Second, try not to drink the pool water. Although, it is safe in small amounts, too much chlorinated or salt water can cause gastrointestinal upset and electrolyte imbalances. Third, never go near a pool without supervision and take extra caution if your pool doesn't have a fence around it to prevent the risk of drowning. If you are allowed to roam free in the backyard, perhaps your mom or dad may consider putting up a fence as it will only add to your safety. Just be safe and enjoy your splashes!

# Dear Sadie: During my walk the other day, I drank out of a puddle and now I don't feel so good. Why? Isn't all water the same? Nauseous Nelly

Dear Nelly: Oh dear ~ sadly, no. As thirsty as you might be at the time, it's best to avoid drinking any stagnant water sources such as puddles or lakes as they can be filled with all kinds of bacteria and can make you very sick. Along with causing nausea, vomiting or diarrhea, it may also lead to more serious health concerns like Leptospirosis, a bacterial infection that can cause severe damage to the kidneys and liver. It's important to drink lots of fresh water and to contact your vet if you experience any of these symptoms. You may need to be treated with antibiotics or anti-nausea medication. Feel better soon!


Dear Sadie: With the warmer weather approaching, what summer safety tips can you offer? Lucy

**Dear Lucy:** Summer can be a wonderful time of year but with it comes some hazards. Here are a few things to look out for. The heat is not our friend. Try to stay cool as much as much as possible by staying in the shade if outdoors for long periods of time or stay inside in air-conditioned spaces. Heavy panting, dry or bright red gums, thick drooling, vomiting, diarrhea, or wobbly legs can all be signs of heat stress which can lead to brain damage or even death. A good haircut and groom may help keep you cooler as well. You should NEVER be left in the car during the summer, as heat can reach dangerous temperatures in only a few minutes, even with the windows cracked open! Also, watch out while walking on hot pavement as it may burn those sensitive paw-pads. Ouch! Try to get your walks in early in the morning or in the evening when temperatures are cooler. Wear sunscreen on your ears, nose, and tummy as those can get sunburned and increase the risk of cancer. Sunscreen containing zinc oxide can be toxic so be sure to wear only formulas specifically made for pets. Be careful around pools and lakes, especially if you can't swim to prevent accidental drowning. Fleas, ticks (Lyme Disease), and parasites (heartworm, hookworms) can be an increased risk during warmer weather, so it's important to use proper prevention as prescribed by your vet. Last but not least, stay hydrated by drinking fresh, cool water often. I recommend adding wet food to your diet in the hotter months to help increase hydration. Whatever you do, have fun and




