

"Wake up Maggie I think I got something to say to you,


It's late December and since you came along our life is full."

Goldens Make Senior Lives Truly Golden

Legendary screen actress, Bette Davis, once said, "Old age ain't no place for sissies."

Never was this quip truer than it is today. Men and women are living longer, family members and friends move and/or pass away, getting out becomes increasingly difficult, and once-loved activities fall by the wayside. But there is one constant source of comfort and companionship that benefits seniors in countless ways ~ a dog!

Think Golden. Brightening the lives of those in their golden years. How fitting is that?

Studies have shown that dogs like Golden Retrievers can help reduce stress, lower blood pressure, and increase both social interaction and physical activity in their senior owners. They also have an extraordinarily positive effect on the symptoms of depression and feelings of loneliness their owners all too often experience. They can even prompt better memory recall in their owners. How? By helping their owners focus and concentrate on something other than their physical problems and their preoccupation with loss and/or aging.

Known for their calm, friendly, and easygoing demeanor, Goldens are blessed with a sweet and gentle temperament. Extremely affectionate, they love to cuddle and please...and nothing is more satisfying or soul warming than a mutual admiration society made for two! Infinitely intuitive, they can sense when their owners are troubled or need a sympathetic 'ear', soothing them simply by their reassuring presence and comfortable silence. And if the seniors adopting them are still fairly active, a daily walk will prove beneficial to them both.

Their keen intelligence, reliability, and muscular build make Goldens ideal assistance dogs for seniors living alone with conditions that require an extra pair of hands or, in this case, paws. Service dogs can retrieve items for them, pull wheelchairs, open doors, and turn lights on and off. They can also help their owners get up if they fall down. Hearing dogs prove invaluable to seniors who are either deaf or partially deaf by alerting them to such important sounds as doorbells, smoke alarms, telephones, and so on. Seizure response dogs assist people with epilepsy or other seizure disorders, summoning help if necessary and bringing them food and/or medication.

While the advantages of seniors adopting a Golden are many, there are several issues that must be addressed beforehand. Whether healthy and mobile or frail and housebound, seniors and their caregivers (from family members to visiting aides) should consider the following:

Have they had a dog before? While it's preferable that they be previous owners, provided they're open to a new and rewarding experience and the commitment that comes with it, first time owners can still make superb owners.

What age of dog is best? Adults are more suitable than puppies with their rambunctious energy, their tendency to chew and nip, and above all, their need for training. Mature dogs (Goldens have an average life span of 10-12 years) have already been housetrained, well socialized with people, and know their basic commands. They also tend to be calmer, with more predictable patterns of behaviour.

Are finances a concern? Since owning a dog involves a significant, long-term financial commitment, a senior's budget must be able to cover not only the dog's every day expenses but any unforeseen emergencies as well.

Is there a backup plan in place for the dog? Should the senior have to go to the hospital, spend time in a short-term rehabilitation facility, move to a long-term care community or pass away, there must be written (not simply verbal) instructions for and arrangements made to ensure the Golden's ongoing care and well-being.

As beneficial as mature dogs are for senior citizens, senior citizens are just as beneficial for mature dogs. Less desirable than their younger counterparts but equally deserving of permanent homes, mature dogs are all too often overlooked at shelters, humane societies, and rescue groups ~ and for all the wrong reasons.

Mature dogs seem to sense when they receive a second chance at the rest of their lives. And any senior savvy enough to adopt one will not only reap the rewards but will be the lucky recipient of a love as endearing as it is enduring.

Home Visits

Potential foster or adoptive families require a home visit where you would engage in conversation and give us your perspective of an adopter or foster. **Estimated time commitment:** totally dependent upon your time and availability

TEAM OPPORTUNITIES

Foster Families

We continue to have Goldens coming into our care! We always need foster homes and we are now looking for foster families across Canada as we continue to grow. Fostering a Golden and helping him/her through a transitional phase is an incredibly rewarding experience because you're the first step in their new life. We also need foster families who are willing to take Goldens with medical or behavioural issues, families without any other dogs or cats in-house, and families who are willing to foster a pair. please fill out a foster application online at www.goldenrescue.ca. Once you've filled out an application, a volunteer will contact you to clarify any points, answer any questions you might have, arrange a home visit, and assign you to a foster mentor.

Fundraising Team Members

We are looking for keen and dedicated volunteers to help grow the fundraising program. With a knowledge or interest in fundraising, we're looking for committed volunteers who share our mission to help develop a fulsome fundraising program. The demand to rescue and save Goldens from around the globe continues to grow and we're striving to strengthen our program to help as many as we can. Led by the volunteer Director of Fundraising, we're looking for help in the following areas:

- identifying and soliciting new individual and corporate partners
- stewarding existing donors to encourage a deeper, more lucrative relationship
- creating fundraising policies, programs, and procedures to maximize donations through various development streams
- training board members or volunteers to solicit and secure donations

Estimated time commitment: 10-20 hours per month

Volunteer Coordinators

The Volunteer Coordinators (VCs) are vital members of our events team and they are responsible for the coordination of volunteers (both two and four legged) for our events. The events occur between April to December and it is our goal that each VC will oversee three to four events for the year. Events can be done remotely and involves mostly emailing with some phone work starting about two weeks prior to the event. Please note that the VC is not required to attend the event. Some duties include monitoring emails and responding accordingly; scheduling volunteers; sending out various emails

throughout the process, and closing out the event. Most of our emails are standard and require minimal editing. You will be provided with all the tools, training, and support you need to achieve these goals. You should have strong organizational and communication skills and a good working knowledge of Excel. Knowledge of Google Drive would be an asset. **Estimated time commitment:** approximately 5-6 hours per event over a three-week period

Wishbone Lottery Team Members

The Wishbone Lottery is our major fundraiser of the year, with spectacular prizes, generating a lot of interest from our supporters and Golden lovers in general. We need volunteers to contact supporters/ adopters/fosters to help us sell tickets. You would be assigned a list of names to contact (primarily via email) asking if they would be willing to sell tickets. Once sellers confirm their interest, you would provide them with support and track their progress with follow up calls/emails, answering questions, and sending more tickets as needed. After the lottery's closing date, you would reconcile sales for your group. Ticket sales are going to run from November to August and there is more of a time commitment at the beginning with the lottery's 'lift off'. Estimated time commitment: 10-20 hours at the beginning with periodical follow-ups

Dear Tillie: Sometimes we need to trust our humans and believe they want to keep us safe. Like you said, you don't know what is behind that door and there could be dangers you are not aware of like a busy road or other animals. Maybe your humans love you too much and don't want you to run away! Whatever the case, you should listen to them. If your humans want you to walk through doorways calmly, they need time and patience in training. They should only allow you to walk through the door when you are calm and not excited, and wait until you have settled down before exiting. The wait may seem long, but eventually, in time, you will learn to not bolt when you have the chance.

Dear Sadie: My mom always says that I'm a smart cookie and brags to her friends about me all the time. I know I'm pretty awesome...I mean, I think I'm smarter than this mini human that lives here. All he does is cry, sleep, and 'go outside' in his pants. But just how smart am I? Bandit the Brainiac Golden

Dear Bandit: Besides being known for being incredibly gentle and sweet, I am proud to say that we, as Golden Retrievers, are the fourth most intelligent breed of canine, just behind Border Collies, Poodles, and German Shepherds. We can understand more than 150 words, which is on par with a two-year old human. Of course, that number goes up depending

on how much time our humans work with us to increase our vocabulary and could be as much as 250 words! Not too bad, huh? Also, we are capable of counting to 4 or 5 and to deliberately deceive other dogs and humans for rewards. So yes, you are a smart cookie!

Dear Sadie: Sometimes when my human takes me to the leash-free park, there is one dog who is really mean and scary. Every time we happen to go at the same time, this dog will run towards me, then bark and lunge at me. I'm not sure why she doesn't like me...I think I'm lovely. I'm not sure what to do. I really like going but not when she is there. Do I find a new park? Scared Sally

Dear Sally: I'm sorry that you are going through this! The park is supposed to be a fun place to visit where you can let loose and burn off some energy. You never mentioned where the other dog's humans were when these situations occur and what they do to stop it, if anything. A lot of times inattentive owners are to blame for attacks more than the aggressive dogs. Once fights have broken out, owners have already missed several signals. The key for owners is to pay attention, stay off their cell phones, and to keep an eye out for threatening situations before they happen. If the other dog's owners aren't watching, or not doing anything to curb behaviour, then it may be time to find a new dog park. Dear Rex: I totally understand your dislike and fear towards grooming but it's necessary. Not only is for appearance and to keep you smelling good, it's also important for overall health. Grooming can help check for things like ticks, rashes, infections or issues with nails, ears and eyes before they become real problems. My tip prior to any grooming experience is to visit the groomers to familiarize yourself with it first without any grooming taking place ~ like a practice run. If the visit is made fun, you will associate it as being a happy place and will likely have a better experience. If made aware of your anxiety, the groomer can take breaks or avoid some things until the next visit if you are still anxious. If all else fails, your vet may be able to prescribe you something to help relax you during your spa day. All the best.

Dear Sadie: I've noticed lately that my water bowl becomes cloudy fast and there is a slimy residue at the bottom of it. My dad changes the water every day (sometime twice!), so I know it's fresh. What is it and can it make me sick? Concerned Charlie

Dear Charlie: Yes and no. That residue is actually called Biofilm as is made up of different types of bacteria, good and bad, bound together to form a thick substance to help it stick to a surface. Among many functions, good bacteria helps to break down food in the gut and is part of a healthy immune system. Bad bacteria, on the other hand, can cause a number of infections including urinary tract, bladder, and middle-ear infections. It is important for your humans to wash your water bowl at least once a week with hot, soapy water, or daily if it is used by many different dogs such as in a doggy daycare situation.
